Beginning Farmer Course Still Has Openings

Spooner Ag Research Station – Jan. 20 - Mar. 10 8 Sessions - Thursdays, 11:00-1:15

There are still openings to attend the Wisconsin School for Beginning Dairy and Livestock Farmers course offered locally at the Ag Research Station in Spooner. The remaining sessions are \$120 or \$15 each. You can also take the course on-line at your convenience.

The course began on Nov. 11 and is offered by the University of Wisconsin Farm and Industry Short Course. Class sessions are held on Thursdays from 11:00 a.m.-1:15 p.m. Additional discussion and questions following each session are encouraged. Delivery will be done through interactive PowerPoint and audio. The course applies to both grass-based and conventional farming. An important focus of the remaining sessions is business planning. Since the course began in 1995, over 400 students have enrolled and a third of them have gone on to start their own farms.

- Feb. 24 Farm and grazing management, environmental stewardship
- Mar. 3 Emerging markets: biomass for renewal energy, organic and grass-based markets
- Mar. 10 Bringing it all together, perspectives on start-up dairy / livestock business startups

WI Dairy & Beef Animal Husbandry Conference - Neillsville, March 4

University of Wisconsin-Extension will host a one-day statewide conference on March 4 to address one of the most important emerging issues in agriculture – animal handling and well-being. Dairy and beef producers, veterinarians, farm service providers, educators and interested elected officials are invited to attend this conference that focuses on expanding awareness and understanding about the growing concern nationwide of how farm animals are cared for and what the implications could be for large animal agriculture in Wisconsin.

Naomi Botheras, Animal Welfare Specialist from Ohio State, will open the conference with "Animal Handling and Production-Based Outcomes." Return on investment for training stock people to improve animal handling can be quite high. Strategies to improve both animal stress levels and production will be covered.

Trevor DeVries, Department of Animal and Poultry Science at Guelph in Canada, will present "Utilizing Knowledge of Dairy Cow Behavior to Improve Cow Comfort." Producers invest significant amounts of money in constructing comfortable housing for dairy cattle. This presentation will focus on the feeding, standing and lying areas.

Curt Pate, a Montana rancher and stockmanship trainer, will provide a live cattle handling demonstration for dairy and beef breakout sessions. Kurt Vogel, UW-River Falls Professor of Animal Science, will outline how to measure animal welfare on farms. The industry and producers are looking to quantify animal welfare and comfort so that it can be communicated to the consumer in a clearer way.

To wrap up, there will be a panel of food buyers and producers who will share ways that producers can boost consumer confidence in the welfare of animals on Wisconsin farms, including insight into potential animal care standards.

The conference will be held on Friday, March 4 at American Legion Hall in Neillsville. Registration begins at 8 a.m. and the conference concludes at 3:30 p.m. Registration is \$40. Plot Results at the UW-Spooner Ag Research Station

Nitrogen Rate on Soybeans at Different Soil pH

Farmers and researchers sometimes wonder if soybeans need more nitrogen than they produce themselves. Other states have had research of the nitrogen needs of soybeans, but no research was available in Wisconsin. This year the soil pH plots were in soybeans so I side-dressed 25 or 50 lbs per acre of nitrogen as urea or ammonium sulfate when the plants were V2 (approximately 4" tall). Soybean Varieties used were NK Brand S06-W2 and Asgrow 0808.

Yields across soil pH ranged from 35.4 to 42.0 bu/A with the top yield at a pH of 6.2. This fits right in line with the UW Fertility recommendation guidelines of a soil pH for soybeans of 6.3. Actually harvest yields in this trial of the 5.2 and 5.7 plots were statistically the same as the 6.2 yields.

As for nitrogen rates, small yield increases of 1 to 2 bushels per acre were measured for added nitrogen. The ammonium sulfate plots yielded slightly higher than the urea plots. This demonstrates a small increase in yield from the added sulfur of the ammonium sulfate. However, none of these yield increases are enough to be "economically" beneficial to cover the additional fertilizer cost.

Winter Wheat Fungicide Trial

In fall of 2009, a winter wheat trial was planted to determine the effect of fungicide application around flag leaf to boot stage. Four varieties of winter wheat were used and Headline was the fungicide available for use. Variety yields averaged 70.6 to 73.2 bushels per acre and were not statistically significant. There was a significant yield difference of 6.4 bushels per acre more winter wheat in plots that were treated with fungicide.

Soybean Population

This spring, UW-Extension Soybean Specialist, Shawn Conley, listed protocol for UW-Extension Ag Agents to conduct "On-Farm" soybean seeding rate trials. A seeding rate trial was planted in one of the Spooner Ag Research Station production fields with our normal 30" row planter. Target seeding rates were 120,000, 160,000 and 200,000. We included replications of 60,000 seeds per acre as well.

Yields were highest at the 160,000 seeding rate but the 120,000 and 200,000 seeding rate yields were not significantly different. At the higher seeding rates, final plan populations were much lower than initially intended. Also of interest, was that even with very low plant population of seeding 60,000 seeds per acre, yields were only reduced by 2 to 4.7 bushels.

The four sessions will feature both live and distance education presentations and generally run from 6:00-8:30 p.m. There is a \$5 charge for individual sessions or \$15 for the entire series. Session 1 - Know Your Numbers: Pricing, Buying, and Selling Hay

Jan. 10 - Monday at Hayward, Siren, Maple, Ashland, Ladysmith and Phillips

Producing a profit requires that you know your numbers. In this session, we'll discuss using enterprise budgets to determine your costs of production for producing hay and further help you decide what to charge when selling your hay. Matt Hanson, UW-Extension Ag Agent from Dodge County, will join us via teleconference to discuss how the Dodge Co. Forage Council operates the Beaver Dam hay auction. We'll also cover hayland lease agreements and how to negotiate stumpage prices for producers and landowners.

Session 2 - Forage Quality: Evaluating, Testing, and Protecting Hay

Whether buying or selling hay, it is crucial to know and understand hay quality. We'll teach you how to evaluate quality with hands-on demonstrations. Otto Wiegand, UW-Extension Ag Agent from Spooner, will present at each location. We'll also cover storage options to protect quality and quantity of stored hay.

Session 3 - Forage Management I: Growing and Harvesting High Quality Hay

Feb. 10 – Thursday at Hayward, Siren, Maple, Ashland, Ladysmith and Phillips

Northern Wisconsin can be a great place to produce high quality hay, if it's done right. We'll discuss the many aspects of hay production including: soil testing and nutrient management, sward density, species composition, and compaction. Dr. Dan Undersander, UW-Extension Forage Agronomist, will join us via teleconference. We'll also discuss the many aspects of hay harvest including: harvest timing, drying, preservatives, and baling.

Session 4 - Forage Management II: New Seedings and Low-Cost Renovations

In this session, you'll learn about low-cost strategies for improving the productivity and species composition of your hay fields. As a result of these programs, participants improved their recordkeeping, made changes to insurance coverage, implemented production changes, made decisions on retirement, and more!

The workshop will start with a Farmers Panel to discuss how farm women handle working on the farm or off the farm, balancing family issues and still finding personal or leisure time. Come and share your ideas and experiences in balancing farm, family and personal priorities with the panel. Other topics include agriculture loans, government programs, grants and other resources,



practical considerations for human resource management, and valueadded markets. The conference will end with a taste of northwestern Wisconsin, featuring local wines, breads, cheese and chocolate.

NRCS Offers New Practices and Funds for Farm and Wildlife Lands

The Natural Resources
Conservation Service (NRCS) has
announced that the Wisconsin sign-up
for the Environmental Quality
Incentives Program (EQIP) and
Wildlife Habitat Incentives Program
(WHIP) will be open until January
14th for 2011 funding.

The EQIP program is the primary program available to farmers for farmland conservation work, offering flat rate payments for over 70 conservation practices. WHIP offers cost sharing to restore wildlife habitat for targeted species.

Several new practices are available in EQIP this year.
Composting Facility can be used to help reduce manure pathogens and

odors as well as benefit water quality. Two new forestry practices, Tree and Shrub Pruning as well as Forest Slash Treatment are now available.

Common practices signed up for in the past in Burnett-Washburn County include Grassed Waterway, Pasture/Hayland planting, Well Abandonment, Nutrient Management and Prescribed Grazing.

Sign-up for Wildlife Habitat

The Wildlife Habitat Incentives
Program (WHIP) provides technical
assistance and cost sharing to restore
wildlife habitat. Depending on the site,
streams, prairies and other types of
habitat including habitat for pollinators
may qualify to be restored. Two new
practices, Wetland Restoration and
Wetland Creation are new for this
sign-up and have multiple benefits,
including habitat for migratory birds.

Signing up now will ease the potentially long wait times and scheduling conflicts that arise as the June 1st deadline approaches.

Producers need to sign a DCP or ACRE contract annually to be eligible to receive program benefits. Please contact your local county office today to set up an appointment!
